School bus safety in Ontario: A quick guide for families

Riding the school bus can be an exciting part of your child's day

This guide shares simple safety tips to help families feel confident about school bus routines.

What should my child do at the bus stop?

Your child should arrive at the bus stop a few minutes early and wait in a safe spot away from the road. They should only approach the bus when:

- it has come to a full stop
- the stop arm is out and red lights are flashing
- all traffic has stopped

What should my child do on the bus?

Your child should quickly find a seat and sit facing forward. They should keep the aisle clear and their arms and head inside the bus at all times.

They should listen to the bus driver and avoid loud noises or distractions during the ride.

How does my child safely get off the bus?

When the bus stops, your child should exit in single file without pushing or running. If they need to cross the road, they should:

- take 10 big steps away from the bus so the driver can see them clearly
- wait for the driver's signal
- walk in front of the bus (never behind)
- look all ways before crossing

If something is dropped near the bus, children should never pick it up themselves. They should ask the driver or another adult for help.

Helping your child feel ready

- Practice walking safely to the bus stop together.
- Talk about the steps to take when getting on or off the bus.
- Help your child remember their bus number and stop location.
- Remind your child to speak up if they ever feel unsure or unsafe.

What families and drivers need to know

It's against the law to pass a school bus when its red lights are flashing and the stop arm is out.

- On roads **without a median**, drivers in **both directions** must stop.
- On roads **with a median**, only vehicles behind the bus must stop.

Penalties can include fines, demerit points and even jail time.

Working together to keep kids safe

Ontario's school bus rules are designed to keep children safe — every ride, every day. By working together, families, drivers and schools help make sure every student gets to and from school safely.

Safe travels every day!

Ride along with Alex and discover how every trip to and from school can be safe and fun. From waiting at the stop to finding the perfect seat, this story helps kids feel confident about bus routines.
